

MOOSBURGERIN 1^{er} Grüner Veltliner



Etymologie und Geschichte

Mentioned the first time in the 9th century. The name hints to the small town and monastery of Moosburg close to Freising in Bavaria. Quite a number of alpine monasteries maintained farms around the city of Krems and left their mark in the local communities. The vineyard was replanted in 2000 and now enters it's prime years. Margit changed the wines gender to female and renamed the wine „Veltlinerin©“.

Boden

Mighty Löss layer on chalky conglomerat rock of the Hollenburg-Karlstettener-Formation. As the Löss layer is thick enough for the roots of the vines not reaching through to the rocks, we talk about pure Löss. Moosburgerin consists of small terraces of no more than 3-5m height. With only 4ha it's the smallest classified vineyard of our village. As the terraces are quite old, they are not perfectly flat but still have slopes which forces us to a slightly different soil management. Facing directly south, heavily exposed to wind, very dry.

Klima

In the Kremstal valley the eastern, hot pannonic climate meets the cooler, continental influenced climate of the Waldviertel in the north. During the day our region heats up quickly, during nighttime the cool air from the Waldviertel flows in, which can lead to day and night differences up to 25°C.

Weincharakteristik

Moosburgerin normally produces quite opulent, full-bodied wines, which enchant with creaminess and power. Scent of lokal fruit but also hints of more exotic fruit aswell. The lady of our Wines, the feminine Veltliner.
